

**Forever, or a Long, Long Time** by Caela Carter





## Re: College Application Month activities being held at Enderlin Area High School

Enderlin – It will be a bit busier than normal at Enderlin Area High School on Oct. 23, 2017. High school seniors are looking ahead to next fall and submitting their college applications as part of College Application Month in North Dakota.

As an incentive to start planning early and participate in the activities, Bank of North Dakota is paying one \$35 application fee per student when they apply to a North Dakota college. Community Dollars for Scholars volunteer, Jess Schimming will be assisting the students along with one or two area colleges Enrollment Services representatives.

Diana Fuhrman, counselor at Enderlin Area School states, “This is the second year our school is participating in this event. It is an excellent way to help students who feel a bit overwhelmed with the college application process to actually experience it and realize they can figure it out.”

Enderlin Area High School is one of 118 high schools across the state participating in College Application Month. Last year 84 high schools participated in College Application Month.

College Application Month is part of a national effort to increase the numbers of people applying to college early in the year. Recent data distributed by the North Dakota Department of Commerce states that 41 percent of North Dakotans complete at least two years of college, but numbers fall significantly after that. Only 27 percent of North Dakotans achieve a bachelor’s degree, and of that number, only eight percent continue on to receive a graduate or professional degree. Bachelor’s and

professional/graduate degrees both fall below the national average.

“We are grateful to our partners in banking, secondary education, and higher education for their assistance. This project is an excellent opportunity to demonstrate to young people in our state that they are valued and their communities are invested in their future,” states Bank of North Dakota President/CEO Eric Hardmeyer. “A well-educated workforce is essential to support the state’s economy.”

In addition to Bank of North Dakota, other partners in the effort are the North Dakota Office of the Governor, North Dakota University System and North Dakota Department of Public Instruction.
